

You Have a Story To Tell

Imagine going through your grandmother's attic and finding her mother's journal. How exciting to read how your great grandmother lived, her thoughts, her opinions, her trials and the day to day things she jotted down. One word of caution: Be careful to not write things that could one day cause emotional damage or hurtful feelings. Be aware of the things you write, although private during your lifetime, may be read in the future. It is sometimes a great idea to mention in your will or let a close family/friend know who you would like your journals left to when you have died. Your story will mean more to those closest to you than strangers.

So, go ahead and try it. Write a story about your life. Once you get going, it usually gets easier; sometimes even hard to put the pen down! Think of your great granddaughter going through the attic and the joy she will have - when she finds the journals you wrote so many years earlier. Tell her how much she means to you although you never met and relate to her **YOUR STORY!**
