Thoughts on offsite backup [e.g. Carbonite; Mozy....]

Problem? 9. Can I use Carbonite to free up space on my hard drive?

No. Carbonite is online backup – not online storage. It is meant to be a backup of the files that are on your computer – not a place to store files in order to free up space on your hard drive. If you remove any file from your hard drive, we wait 30 days for you to recover it, and then we delete that file from our servers, too.

-----FOLLOW UP TO QUESTIONS FROM LAST MEETING-----

To get to Windows Explorer (NOT the Internet Explorer browser – this is the directory listing for your hard drive), click on COMPUTER or MY COMPUTER in the start menu.

In answer to the questions on adding tags to pictures and searching for that tag. This seems to work for jpg files, but doesn't work for pdf or gif or txt files (ones I've tried so far): <http://windows.microsoft.com/en-US/windows7/Tag-pictures-so-theyre-easier-to-find>

This search works for the directory and it's subdirectories, so you'll need to be in your main picture or genealogy folder to find the tag. I'll demo at the April meeting to show tag (xavier) under my sample surname directory in the genealogy folder. windows explorer; search (top right); tag:[xavier].

They mention a third party filter that will allow the tagging of PDF files. I haven't tried this.

Another note: I didn't find a reference to explain the notation of "promiscuous" on the 18xx school list. Anyone have a thought?

Good idea from Flip-Pal webinar: Clear acrylic sheet over photo; write names with web marker on acrylic sheet; scan photo, then rescan without acrylic sheet. Gives you two pics – one with names of people in picture. Can also use Eye-Fi card instead of SD card and have pics sent to computer or iPhone or iPad via Wi-Fi instead of a USB connection.
