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









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# IMAGE SEARCH, IN CHROME, ON AN IPHONE

<p>1</p>  <p>Install Box or Dropbox, or an equivalent app, on your smartphone.</p>	<p>6</p>  <p>Paste the copied link into the search bar.</p>
<p>2</p>  <p>In Box, hit the '+' sign and then CHOOSE FROM LIBRARY to choose the image from your image library.</p>	<p>7</p>  <p>Google will open the URL containing your photo. The picture is now known to Google.</p>
<p>3</p>  <p>Choose the image, then UPLOAD. Your image has now been copied to Box (or Dropbox). Open the image within Box.</p>	<p>8</p>  <p>Hold your finger on the picture and choose: SEARCH GOOGLE FOR THIS IMAGE</p>
<p>4</p>  <p>Click the LINK ICON (looks like a chain link) at the bottom of your screen then click 'ENABLE LINK', if necessary, then COPY LINK. The actual URL of your photo is copied to the clipboard.</p>	<p>9</p>  <p>Google will return a list of locations for that image. You can choose the match for your photo. In our case it was a Library of Congress map.</p>
<p>5</p>  <p>Open CHROME.</p>	<p>10</p>  <p>You can click the link, that matches your picture, and visit the site to obtain your source information.</p>

The purpose of this exercise: If you had copied a photo from a site and had forgotten to write down the source of that picture, you need to be able to find that picture again to know the source. This activity creates an actual URL for your picture allowing it to be placed in Google, from which you can search. If you had the picture on a PC, you could just drag the photo into the image search box of Google and the search would happen.
