

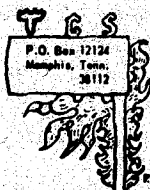

Dear Members,

Hope a lot of you can be with us for the KENTUCKY SEMINAR on August 4th. Plan your vacation to come this way.

DIRECTIONS for out-of-towners: Follow Interstate 240 toward the east (toward Nashville), and leave the interstate at the Poplar West Exit (Exit No. 11). Holiday Inn I 240 is just west of Interstate 240 at this point, and visible from the highway.

Some of you with children can't do as much field work in the summer, so this is a good time to do your homework. From letters we get, this is an often neglected area. I'm amazed at how many people write, "So-and-so was born in Podunk County in 1802" when that county had not been formed at that time.

Study up on the counties you are working in. Be sure to know when and from what it was formed. Read a history of it. Study maps with water courses and pinpoint where your family lived. This is particularly valuable if there was more than one person with the same name. "Homework" will often help solve problems. Certainly, it will make your research easier and more interesting.

April, 1973 (No. 7): "Descendants of George Hubbard, 1594-1960" traces branch of the family from England to New England and Virginia, thence to Tenn., Ky., Ark., Mo., Ala., Ga., Ohio, Ind., Texas, with complete documentation from these states -- records of deeds, marriages, bibles, family histories, censuses, letters, vital statistics, churches, Revolutionary War. Also some "how-to" information, miscellaneous data, and queries. A painstakingly-prepared publication.

TENNESSEE - A STUDENTS' GUIDE TO LOCALIZED HISTORY by William T. Alderson and THE OHIO VALLEY - A STUDENTS' GUIDE TO LOCALIZED HISTORY by R. E. Bants (1966). Both edited by Clifford L. Lord. Order from Mrs. Clyde Lunch, Route 5, Franklin, Tenn. 37064. \$3.00 each. These brief histories outline the early development of these areas, and serve as valuable background for the genealogist. The Ohio Valley book encompasses the parts of Pa., Ohio, Ind., Tenn. and N.C. in the Ohio River watershed.

Mrs. Dirk Petersmann (Sabra), 2255 N. Cahuenga Blvd., Apt. 22, Los Angeles, Calif. 90068, would like to hear from persons interested in the traditions of the American graveyard -- tombstone art and its meaning, humorous and unusual epitaphs and their possible relationship to the design on the stone, and cemetery legends and ghost stories. She would appreciate genealogists' assisting her by noting and sending to her the designs etc. in cemeteries they visit. With reference to design, she says, "The cemetery offers many kinds of folk traditions: for example, the extensive repertoire of carved designs on the stones -- willows, lambs, pointing hands, clasped hands, gates of heaven,....Although many of these designs were transmitted from carver to carver...., strong regional styles often developed....The motifs themselves often have a long history of their own. The willow motif, for example, began as a symbol of unrequited love in 16th century English poetry, but the species we call 'weeping' was not brought to Europe until the 18th century. It quickly became a mourning symbol on gravestones throughout England and America, in the company of a weeping woman and a draped monument...As the design came into use in the Midwest, however, the stonemason discarded the other elements, enlarged the willow and endowed it with the additional symbolism of the Tree of Life. It would be fascinating to trace this design through the rest of the country...."

BOOK REVIEWS

THE TENNESSEE GAZETTEER, or TOPOGRAPHICAL DICTIONARY by Eastin Morris (1834) and MAP OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE by Matthew Rhea (1832). Edited by M. McBride and Owen Meredith with an introduction by Mary U. Rothrock (1971). Hard cover, over 325 pages, indexed. Order from The Gazetteer Press, 413 Chesterfield, Nashville, Tennessee 37212. \$15.00.

The Tennessee Gazetteer, long recognized as a valuable work of Tennesseana, has been described by Tennessee historian Stanley F. Horn as an essential adjunct to the study and intelligent reading of Tennessee history. The publication contains annotations; descriptions of counties, towns, post offices, rivers, creeks, mountains, valleys, etc., alphabetically arranged; a general description of the state, including its civil divisions, resources, population, etc.; and a condensed history from the earliest settlements down to the convention of 1834. An appendix lists the practising attorneys-at-law in each county, times of holding courts, and other valuable tables.

GEOGRAPHICAL DESCRIPTION OF THE UNITED STATES WITH THE CONTIGUOUS BRITISH AND SPANISH POSSESSIONS INTENDED AS AN ACCOMPANIMENT TO MELISH'S MAP OF THESE COUNTRIES by John Melish (1816, reprinted 1972). Hard cover, over 180 pages, not indexed. Order from The Gazetteer Press, 413 Chesterfield Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee 37212. \$10.00.

First published at Philadelphia in 1816, this book contains geographical, demographic, and statistical data on the then-existing states and territories. The present limited edition has a new introduction and a dust jacket. The reproduction is from an autographed copy which was presented to President Thomas Jefferson. John Melish was a Scottish-American geographer, traveller, map maker, engraver, and merchant.

THE HIGHLAND CLANS, THEIR ORIGINS AND HISTORY by L. G. Pine (1972). Hard cover, over 200 pages, indexed. Order from Charles E. Tuttle, Inc., Rutland, Vermont 83781. \$7.50.

L. G. Pine has done a tremendous job in presenting the story of the Highland Clans. Beginning with the origin of the Gael, he traces the history of their monarchy, the early Clans and their life and culture, the Clans in the 16th and 17th centuries, 1685 and the age of Revolution, the 1715 Rebellion and the '45 Rising, to the end of Gaeldom and Disaster. The author portrays the survival of the Clans as a romantic conception of the Highland way of life, and the adoption of the "half-naked savages" dress as the national costume of Scotland.

BIOGRAPHICAL DICTIONARIES AND RELATED WORKS - FIRST SUPPLEMENT. Edited by Robert B. Slocum (1972). Hard cover, over 852 pages; author, title and subject indexes. Order from Gale Research Company, Book Tower, Detroit, Michigan 48226. \$25.00.

The supplement greatly increases the usefulness of the major bibliography of collective biography by adding 3,442 sources of biographical information. The publication achieves comprehensive world coverage of published biographical dictionaries, plus such related materials as bio-bibliographies, collections of epitaphs, genealogical works having biographical value, dictionaries of anonyms and pseudonyms containing biographical sketches, government and legislative materials that include substantial biographical material, bibliographies of individual and collective biography, biographical indexes, and selected portrait catalogs.

THE GOODSPEED HISTORIES OF MONTGOMERY, ROBERTSON, HUMPHREYS, STEWART, DICKSON, CHEATHAM, HOUSTON COUNTIES OF TENNESSEE. Reprinted (1972) from Goodspeed's History of Tennessee (1886). Hard cover, over 1402 pages, not indexed. Order from Woodward and Stinson Printing Company, Columbia, Tennessee \$15.50.

The reprinting of this well-known publication is timely. The work is well done, and the materials of high quality. As in all Goodspeed histories, many early settlers of each county are mentioned.

HANDBOOK OF HERALDRY, Fourth Edition, by John E. Cussans (1970). Hard cover, over 353 pages, indexed. Order from Gale Research Company, Book Tower, Detroit, Michigan 48226. \$15.00.

Instruction for tracing pedigrees and deciphering ancient manuscripts and rules for appointment of liveries are well presented. Over 400 illustrations, with prefaces, footnotes and an introduction, should make this book a valuable tool for both novice and expert.

YARBERRY, RENFRO AND ALLIED LINES OF TENNESSEE AND ARKANSAS by Barbara G. Yarberry. Soft cover, over 21 pages; has a place index. Order from the author, 121 West Second Avenue, Ajo, Arizona 85321.

The small number of pages does not in any way diminish the value and interest of this family story. The families originated in Virginia and North Carolina, moving to Tennessee and later to Hempstead County, Arkansas.

THOMAS TAYLOR AND BENJAMIN BRANCH OF NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE, AND RELATED FAMILIES, compiled by Mrs. Ethyl Taylor Ford (1972). Soft cover, over 214 pages, indexed. Order from the author, 3329 Northeast 20th, Amarillo, Texas 79107. \$15.00.

Mrs. Ford has compiled an elaborate and thorough history of her family. Her genealogy includes some 44 families, originating in Virginia and other southern states. Tennessee furnished several. Family surnames are: Anderson, Ballard, Bedgood, Biles, Bivins, Bradford, Branch, Brooks, Browder, Campbell, Cothran, Clay, Clower, Crockett, Elam, Gaines, Gardner, Goodrich, Hendricks, Hendrix, Houser, Hudgens, Hughes, Jarrett, Lewis, Lygon, Manier/Manire, May, Moore-Prestridge, Neblett, Norwood, Patterson, Prestridge-Wright, Puckett, Ralston, Schneider, Scott, Taylor (James, Joseph M., Thomas), Vance, Wair, Washington, White (Thomas, William Carol), Yeargan (Currey, Eastman, Smith).

THE CHRONICLE OF A SOUTHERN FAMILY by William H. Sebastian (1972). Hard cover, over 142 pages, not indexed. Order from the author, P. O. Box 352, Catlettsburg, Kentucky 41129. \$12.50.

This is a scholarly account of the Sebastian family in America. From Virginia and North Carolina, the Sebastians moved West, taking a prominent part in life in the states where they settled. Interesting biographies are given of William King Sebastian, U. S. Senator from Arkansas, and of Judge Benjamin Sebastian of Kentucky. The absence of an index in such a genealogically valuable book should be remedied.

EARLY LESLIES IN YORK COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, THEIR MIGRATIONS TO TENNESSEE, MISSOURI AND ARKANSAS, THEIR ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS. First Edition by Marion Emerson Murphy, Vice Admiral, U. S. Navy, Retired (1972). Hard cover, over 210 pages, indexed. Order from the author, 3510 Emerson St., San Diego, California 92106. \$7.50.

A well-done, methodical presentation of the Leslie and kindred families from S.C. makes this one of the better family histories. Over 1300 family names are listed.

HABERSHAM COUNTY, GEORGIA, GENEALOGICAL RECORDS, Volume Seven, Parts Seventeen, Eighteen, Nineteen and Twenty, by Herbert B. Kimzey (1972). Soft cover, over 64 pages. Parts 17 and 18 indexed. Order from the author, 400 Grandview Circle, Cornelia, Georgia. \$5.00.

The genealogical importance of Habersham County is well known. In Volume 17, the author has named many first settlers of the county. The four parts of this volume are: Part Seventeen, "Information Taken from Headright Plats and Surveyor's Certificates, Contained in Plat Book 'A', 1818-1850, Habersham County, Georgia." Part Nineteen, "A History of the Early Settlers of Nacoochee Valley", thought to be written by Viv Bristol, furnished by Mrs. J. E. Wickle, dated March 10, 1822. Part Twenty, "Habersham County Deed Book 'D', 1826-1827."

HARDINGS OF NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY, VIRGINIA, AND THEIR RELATED FAMILIES by Lucy Lemoine Waring (1971). Soft cover, over 252 pages, not indexed. Order from the author, P. O. Box 63, Highland Springs, Virginia 23075. \$12.50.

Miss Waring has compiled an exceptionally interesting family history. The Harding family was one of the early families of the "Northern Neck" of Virginia, and much intermarried. Of interest are the excerpts from old books, documents and papers.

CHILDREN OF NASHVILLE, LINEAGES FROM JAMES ROBERTSON by Sarah Foster Kelley (1973). Hard cover, over 450 pages, indexed. Order from Mrs. F. S. Kelley, 567 Whispering Hills Drive, Nashville, Tennessee 37211. \$16.50.

Part I, THE ROBERTSON STORY, is a genealogy of this pioneer Scotch-Irish family, most interestingly told. The story contains numerous names, pioneer stories and histories. Part II, REUNION OF ROBERTSON FACES, tells of the first reunion in Nashville, Oct., 1903, the erection of the monument to the General, and the second reunion June 28, 1972. Part III presents the extensive family tree of General James Robertson in over 220 pages. For those with Tennessee roots, this could be just the book where your ancestors are listed.

REGISTER OF OLD CONCORD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, APPOMATTOX COUNTY, VIRGINIA (1826-1878). Transcribed and edited by Harriett A. Chilton and Mitzi Chilton Wilkerson (1973). Soft cover, over 51 pages, indexed. Order from Mrs. Harriett A. Chilton, 3108 Annandale Road, Falls Church, Virginia 22042. \$2.00.

The Register contains a record of baptisms (1826-1876), a list of members (1826-1878), and obituaries (1829-1854). Also included are abstracts of some session minutes. The names of many of the pastors are given. This is a work of love which should be repeated in more of our churches.

WRIGHT-WASHINGTON AND ALLIED FAMILIES, compiled by Myrtle Viola Sears Steiner and Velma Wright Ellis Wakefield (1973). Soft cover, over 66 pages, not indexed. Order from Mrs. Elizabeth Prather Ellsberry, Box 206, Chillicothe, Mo. \$7.50.

The Wright family was granted land in Virginia in 1658. The long line of these people in America began in the person of Richard Wright, Gentlemen, Captain, Justice, merchant, who was born in England in 1630 and died in Virginia in 1663. Inter-marriages with the Washington, Mottrom and Pope families followed. The family spread west to many states, especially to North Carolina, Kentucky, Indiana and Missouri.

GENEALOGY OF MYERS AND GRIMES FAMILIES by W. Oscar Grimes. Soft cover, over 40 pages, indexed. Order from the author, Box 60, Hillsboro, Indiana 47949. \$3.50.

The Myers and Grimes were German people from the Palatinate, the upper Rhine Valley. They were Protestants who came to Pennsylvania and then to Forsyth, Davidson and Rowan Counties in North Carolina. Migration in 1820-1830 led them to the Ohio

Valley in Indiana (Harrison, Parke, and Fountain Counties), where many family records and descendants are found today. Later descendants have gone to all parts of the nation. This is a most intriguing family history.

THE GENEALOGY OF THE REV. W. H. VAN DEUSEN FAMILY AND HENDRICKSON, BELTON, CHELF, CUSTER, EVANS, AND STAYTON FAMILIES. Compiled by Cherry Laura Van Deusen Pratt (1969). Hard cover, over 85 pages, indexed. Order from the author, R.R. 1, Box 2, Terrace Drive, Ft. Recovery, Ohio 45846. \$7.50.

Mrs. Pratt has compiled an information-filled little genealogy. This family was from Holland, and the author uses the first three chapters to trace the family back to the time of the Roman conquest. The Van Deusen family came to America about 1630, and settled in New Amsterdam; then spread to New England, Toronto, Canada, and the central part of the United States.

JOHN LEWIS "THE LOST PIONEER", HIS ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS (1670-1970) by Daniel Reid Long, Jr. (1971). Hard cover, over 320 pages, indexed. Order from the author, 5309 Springlake Way, Baltimore Maryland 21212. \$10.35.

John Lewis V (ca. 1762-ca. 1828) was acclaimed the first English-speaking settler in what is now St. Louis County, Missouri. John Lewis V's ancestral connections in Virginia included the Ball, Dewson, Eskridge, Foushee, Fox, Garner, Harding, Moltrom, and other families. His wife, Elizabeth Harvey Lewis (mother of his nine children), descended from the Virginia families of Harvey, Middleton, Rogers and Straughn. She was a direct descendant of Mary () Johnson, Ball, Hews, grandmother of George Washington. Biographical histories of his children are included in the volume. Lewis' descendants in Missouri intermarried with families from Maryland, North Carolina and Virginia. Family names cited are: Bowles, Tippet, Leigh (Maryland); Darbes, McDaniels, O'Daniels, Thompson (North Carolina); Boone, Curry, Dennevant, Frazer(ies), Hutchings, Jordan, Long, McAllester, Washington (Virginia).

TRANS-ALLEGHENY PIONEERS by John P. Hale (1886). Edited by Harold J. Dudley (1971). Soft cover, over 422 pages, indexed. Order from Dr. Harold J. Dudley, 2726 Anderson Drive, Raleigh, North Carolina. Soft cover \$7.50. Hardback \$15.00.

Names and stories of the pioneers of western Virginia are presented in "Historical Sketches" of the first white settlements west of the Alleghenies. Principal character is Mary Draper Ingles; another outstanding woman is Christian McBryde McMillan (1727-1811), wife of Gilbert McMillan. A life story of Dr. John V. Hale, author of the first edition, is included. This book, containing names of people whose descendants are listed by the tens of thousands, is a genealogical must, and the style of presentation makes it a delight to read.

WILLIAMSON COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY, Publication No. 2, Spring, 1971. Published by the Williamson County Historical Society, Franklin Tennessee. Soft cover, over 63 pages, indexed. Order from Mrs. George F. Watson, Executive House B-17, Franklin, Tennessee 37064. \$4.00.

The second publication of this Society contains six articles centered on the people of Williamson County, their traditions and customs of the past. Stories, passed from generation to generation, of historic characters and events are grouped around homes in the area that stood steadfast during times of war and peace. The publication is interesting reading, and contains much genealogy.

SATTERLEE-LEY-LY AND ALLIED FAMILIES GENEALOGY by Goldie Satterlee Moffatt assisted by John L. Satterlee (1970). Board cover, over 285 pages, indexed. Order from the author, Mrs. Goldie S. Moffatt, 443 Bond Drive, Perris, California 92370. \$20.00.

This is one of the better family histories, and very interestingly told. The surname

is traced back to the Norsemen, and in England to Sir Edmund de Soterle, born in 1233, and to Sotterley Hall, Suffolk. The first by the name in America was the Rev. William Satterlee, who went to New England in 1650. These two volumes concern Nicholas Satterlee of Washington County, Rhode Island (1680) and all known descendants of Nicholas. In preparation are two volumes to treat with descendants of his brothers, William and Benedict.

THEY CALLED IT STRASBURG (18th and 19th Centuries) by Charles D. Spotts (1968).
Soft cover, over 92 pages, indexed. Order from Clyde L. Groff, 713 Columbia Avenue, Lancaster, Pennsylvania 17605. \$5.00.

This is a Community Historians Annual, Vol. 7, No. 6, publication of the Schaff Library, Lancaster Theological Seminary, Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The monograph on the history of Strassburg Township begins with French fur traders early in the 18th century. The development of the community, roads and schools is traced, and immigrant families are listed and followed in a truly interesting manner. The publication should be of genealogical significance to many people.

The many methods of and approaches to this popular field are thoroughly discussed, and accompanied by examples, charts and diagrams. The organization of the chapters is excellent. Procedures are listed that are helpful in securing maximum accuracy in tracing family histories. A four-section appendix treats the topics: List of Record Publications, State Papers, Reports of the Deputy Keeper, and The Rolls Series. The book describes all possible avenues of genealogical research, the result of the author's broad experience in the field of genealogy.

HISTORIC DEVICES, BADGES, AND WAR-CRIES by Mrs. Bury Palliser (1870, facsimile reprint, 1971). Hard cover, over 435 pages, indexed. Order from Gale Research Company, Book Tower, Detroit, Michigan 48226. \$22.50.

Those concerned with heraldry will not be disappointed with the clear definition of terms and description of devices and badges, together with 293 illustrations. Numerous quotations from ancient and modern authorities and documentations and footnotes increase the value of the work. Three sections on devices, badges and war-cries, arranged in dictionary fashion, are used to present the information. Family members are considered under the name of their houses, Kings under the names of countries, Popes chronologically; cross-references locate the names of specific persons. Brief family histories and background matter illustrate the symbols appropriately. Devices are listed alphabetically in the index, each followed by its motto, the page on which details will be found, and the name of the person or family with which the device is associated. Historians and archeologists who wish to date and identify artifacts, literary historians, and artists will also be delighted with that part of this book which deals with heraldic study relative to their fields.

WILLIAMSON AND FULGHUM FAMILIES

The Williamson family of Virginia, and later of Williamson County, Tennessee, are of the family of Sir Joseph Williamson of "Cobham Hall" in Kent, England. Richard Williamson, the first of the American branch, came to Virginia about 1640 and settled in Surry County across the river from Jamestown. His home was also named "Cobham Hall."

- I. Richard Williamson and his wife, Margaret Sherwood (who married John Jarratt in 1659 following the death of Richard), had the following children:
- A. Richard Williamson.
 - B. Dr. James Williamson married Ann Underwood.
 - C. John Williamson.
 - D. Henry Williamson.
 - E. Dr. Robert Williamson (died 1670). He married Joan Allen, daughter of Colonel Arthur Allen (1602-1670) and Alice Tucker. Col. Allen is said to have built the first brick mansion below the James River. His home was called "Bacon's Castle." Arthur Allen, brother of Joan Allen Williamson, was Speaker of the Virginia House of Burgesses, 1686 and 1688.

Dr. Robert Williamson is listed as a "Doctor of Physick" and was a member of the Virginia House of Burgesses in 1663 and 1666. His will is dated Feb. 11, 1669. Robert Williamson and Joan Allen had the following children:

- 1. Robert Williamson, died without issue in 1688.
- 2. Arthur Williamson.
- 3. George Williamson (died 1723). He married Hester Bridger, daughter of Colonel Joseph Bridger and Hester Pitt. George and Hester Williamson had eight children, among whom was John Williamson.
 - a. John Williamson married Susannah Lowe about 1735, and they were the parents of Colonel Micajah Williamson who married Sarah Gilliam, daughter of William Gilliam and Mary Jarratt. Susan Gilliam Dunlap, a great-granddaughter of Devereaux Gilliam (brother of Mrs. Micajah Williamson) married Gen. Jonathan S. Dawson, a great-great grandfather of this writer.
- 4. Francis Williamson (died 1743). He and his wife, Ann, had four children: Arthur, Benjamin, Joseph, Martha. His will is dated May 14, 1743.
 - a. Arthur Williamson married Ann Exum, daughter of Francis Exum. His will was probated July 9, 1772. Arthur and Ann Exum had four children: Exum, Mary, Jesse, and Arthur.
 - (1) Captain Jesse Williamson, an officer in the American Revolution, was born about 1736 and died in 1801. Jesse Williamson was first married to Mary Person on Oct. 21, 1758, and then to Elizabeth Marable on Dec. 15, 1792. Two of his children married into the Mason family of Virginia.
 - (2) Arthur Williamson (died 1781). He married first Eliza (in Albemarle Parish, Va., records); he must have married again for his will mentions wife Rebecca. Colonial Records of Virginia list Arthur Williamson as a Patriot of the Revolution, since he officially supplied brandy to the army. Arthur's children were:
 - (a) Sarah Williamson married Thomas Gilliam on May 19, 1774.
 - (b) Mary Williamson married William Graves, son of Solomon and Martha Graves.
 - (c) John Williamson married Martha Gilliam on Jan. 16, 1783.
 - (d) Ann Williamson was born on Aug. 8, 1767, and married Frederick Pennington on July 27, 1786.
 - (e) Martha Williamson was born on Aug. 24, 1770, and married Thomas Loftin on Jan. 6, 1790.

- (f) Benjamin Williamson.
- (g) Susannah Williamson married Charles Smith on March 14, 1796.
- (h) Thomas Williamson was born on March 3, 1765; died Jan. 22, 1816, in Williamson County, Tenn.; on Sept. 23, 1785, in Sussex County, Virginia, he married Martha Graves, daughter of Solomon Graves and Sarah. Martha Graves was born June 21, 1768, and died May 30, 1828, in Williamson County, Tenn.

Thomas and Martha Graves William [(h) See above.] left Virginia and came to what is now Williamson County, Tennessee, just prior to 1800. A tax list of 1804 shows that they had 500 acres on Spencer's Creek; several hundred more acres were acquired during the next few years. Thomas Williamson's will and inventory of sales is dated 1816. Thomas and Martha Williamson and several of their children are buried in the Williamson Family Cemetery on Mallory Road in Williamson County. Their children:

1. William Winfield Williamson was born Jan. 20, 1787. He married Elizabeth Phipps in Davidson County, Tenn., on Sept. 10, 1814.
2. Benjamin Williamson was born on May 5, 1790 and died on July 15, 1847 in Shelby County, Tenn. He married Cynthia Hope (1798-1865), daughter of William and Jane Miller Hope, on Jan. 18, 1815, in Williamson County.
3. Susannah Williamson married James Gary on April 10, 1817.
4. Nancy Williamson was born 1797; died Sept. 1, 1838. She married Henry J. Hutton, Jan. 26, 1819.
5. Henry Williamson died 1831 (court records).
6. Elizabeth Williamson was born March 9, 1803, and died May 5, 1849. She married Loving H. Wooldridge on May 29, 1822. Their son was Dr. Ferdinand S. Wooldridge.
7. Sarah Winfield Williamson was born April 11, 1805, and died Dec. 2, 1835. She married Henry Eelbeck on July 31, 1823. Henry Eelbeck was a carriage maker in Franklin, Tennessee.
8. Martha Graves Williamson married Matthew Craddock on Jan. 21, 1830.
9. Minerva Williamson was born in 1815. She married Felix Whitfield on Jan. 3, 1837.
10. John Graves Williamson was born Jan. 31, 1795; died July, 1831. On Jan. 27, 1820, he married Nancy Key, niece of Judge Thomas Stuart, the first Circuit judge of Williamson County, Tennessee.
11. Mary (Polly) Clark Williamson was born Sept. 20, 1792, and died Nov. 17, 1878. She married Theophilus Fulghum in Williamson County on Jan 2, 1810. Theophilus Fulghum was born Dec. 15, 1781 and died Jan. 13, 1856. The Fulghum family was in Wayne County, N. C., as early as 1769, at which time John, Michael, and Rayford Fulghum appear on a tax list. Rayford Fulghum, the father of Theophilus, was born in N. C. in 1743, and in 1764 married Winnifred Pearce (Pierce) (1748-1833), daughter of Arthur Pearce and Mary Everett. Everett Pearce, brother of Mrs. Rayford Fulghum, was a member of the N. C. State Legislature from Johnston County. Arthur Pearce, father of Mrs. Rayford Fulghum, was a soldier in the American Revolution, and is listed in the DAR Patriot Index. Arthur Pearce was born in 1723, and died Oct. 2, 1792. The Fulghum (Fulgham) family had come to N. C. from Isle of Wight County, Va., where Captain Anthony Fulgham patented 1600 acres on July 12, 1665. The family originated in Derbyshire, England, where the name was spelled "Foljambe." One Hercules Foljambe held land in Derbyshire during the reign of Henry VIII, and was with the forces of the Duke of Cumberland in his attack on Puerto Rico in 1597. Theophilus and Arthur Fulghum sons of Rayford and descendants of Hercules Foljambe, arrived in Williamson County about 1799, and settled on Spencer's Creek. About 1815, Theophilus and Polly Williamson Fulghum moved to what is now Cheatham County, Tennessee. (However, some members of the Fulghum family have always been in Williamson County since its founding.) Their children:
 - a. Williamson Fulghum was born in 1810, and married Martha McQuary; d. 1882.
 - b. Benjamin Fulghum was born in 1814, and married Caroline Ferebee, Aug. 26, 1840.

- c. Martha Fulghum married Philip M. Williams on Dec. 2, 1840.
- d. John Graves Fulghum was born Sept. 26, 1823, and died April 21, 1898. He married Margaret Rowzee on Aug. 4, 1852.
- e. Nancy Fulghum was born about 1828.
- f. Theophilus Pearce Fulghum was born in March of 1831, and died on Aug. 21, 1838.
- g. Arthur Fulghum was born about 1832.
- h. Sally Fulghum was born about 1832.
- i. Rayford Fulghum was born in 1817, and died Sept. 11, 1858. He had a store in Shelbyville, Tennessee.
- j. James H. Fulghum was born Oct. 3, 1821, and died Feb. 18, 1901. He married Eliza Jane Ussery on Oct. 4, 1857, and her sister, Mary Ussery, on May 24, 1865. Eliza Jane Ussery was born March 27, 1839, and died March 23, 1860; Mary Ussery was born Jan. 9, 1844, and died May 28, 1904. Eliza Jane and Mary were the daughters of Mastin Ussery (1800-1868) and Elizabeth Fowler (a daughter of William Fowler and Deborah Liles, who married in Nashville in October of 1798). Mastin Ussery was a grandson of Thomas Ussery, a soldier of the American Revolution and a member of the N. C. House of Representatives from 1788 to 1795. Mastin's father, Robert Ussery, married Mary Cheairs, member of a pioneer Maury County, Tennessee family. Major Nathaniel Cheairs, her cousin, was one of the outstanding citizens of Spring Hill, Tennessee. Mastin Ussery settled on Dog Creek near Kingston Springs, Tennessee, about 1817, and was a County Judge for his district of Davidson County from 1841 until 1854.

James H. Fulghum and Mary Ann Ussery had the following children:

- (1) James Thomas Fulghum was born June 28, 1866.
- (2) Theophilus Fulghum was born April 1, 1868.
- (3) Sallie Fulghum was born Oct. 17, 1870, and died Aug. 19, 1948. She married Thomas H. Moss on Dec. 23, 1888.
- (4) Nannie G. Fulghum was born May 22, 1873, and died July 16, 1899.
- (5) Willie P. Fulghum was born Jan. 11, 1876, and died March 1, 1897.
- (6) John Arthur Fulghum was born Sept. 1, 1878.
- (7) Mattie Fulghum was born Jan. 14, 1881.

Children of James H. Fulghum and Eliza Jane Ussery:

- (1) Mary Clark Fulghum (twin) was born June 26, 1858, and died Nov. 4, 1892. She married her first cousin, William James Fulghum, Aug. 16, 1876. (See family of Thomas Williamson Fulghum which follows.)
- (2) Elizabeth Brown Fulghum (twin) was born June 26, 1858, and died March 23, 1900. She married Hugh Mays.
- (3) Eliza Jane Fulghum was born March 12, 1860, and died July 25, 1860.
- k. Thomas Williamson Fulghum was born in 1816, and died in 1916, just three months before his 100th birthday. He married Martha Woodward on Dec. 9, 1840. Martha Woodward was the daughter of Benjamin F. Woodward and Harriet Burnett, who married in Davidson County on Aug. 12, 1821. The Woodward and Baxter families were closely allied, and were early settlers at what is called the "Narrows of the Harpeth River." In fact, Edmund Woodward, uncle of Martha Woodward Fulghum, married Nancy Baxter on Feb. 22, 1816. Nancy was a sister of Judge Nathaniel Baxter and an aunt of Jere Baxter, President of the Tennessee Central Railroad. Benjamin F. Woodward, brother of Martha Woodward Fulghum, was a founder of Nashville's Mount Olivet Cemetery. For many years, Benjamin F. Fulghum, Martha's son, was a florist at Mount Olivet.

Children of Thomas Williamson Fulghum and Martha Woodward:

- (1) Richard Fulghum was born in 1841.
- (2) John Arthur Fulghum was born in 1842, and was a soldier in Company H of the 42nd Confederate Regiment of Tennessee.
- (3) Harriet E. Fulghum was born in 1843 and married Nicholas Perkins Sneed (1840-1912) on Jan. 15, 1867. He was the son of James P. Sneed

and Judith Herbert. His ancestors, which consisted of the Sneed, Perkins, and Hardeman families, were among the founding families of Williamson County.

Children of Nicholas Perkins Sneed and Harriet Fulghum:

(a) Judith Sneed was born May 22, 1870; (b) John Sneed was born Sept. 2, 1871; (c) Pleasant Sneed was born Dec. 20, 1872, and died July 1, 1873; (d) William Sneed; (e) Harriet Sneed; (f) Martha Elizabeth Sneed was born Feb. 14, 1868. She married James H. Wiles, Jr., and had three children: Joseph Sneed Wiles, James Wiles, and Nellie Wiles. The Wiles family had a funeral home in Nashville for many years.

- (4) Mary Fulghum was born in 1845.
- (5) Sallie Fulghum married Greenwood Payne. Dr. John Payne of Nashville is their grandson.
- (6) Benjamin F. Fulghum was born about 1853 and was for many years florist of Mount Olivet Cemetery. After the death of Benjamin F. Woodward, he was florist of Central State Hospital, also in Nashville. He married Binns.
- (7) Lena Fulghum was born about 1855. She married Lonnie Tidwell.
- (8) Theophilus Fulghum was born in 1859. He married Mattie Dunn Oct. 6, 1881.
- (9) Tabitha Fulghum died unmarried.
- (10) Martha Fulghum.
- (11) William James Fulghum was born Dec. 15, 1844, and died Nov. 22, 1947, just before his 103rd birthday. He married his first cousin Mary Clark Fulghum, daughter of James H. Fulghum and Eliza Jane Ussery, on Aug. 16, 1876. (See above for family of James H. Fulghum.) Their children: (a) James Thomas Fulghum was born May 20, 1877, and died Oct. 2, 1942. He married Margaret Mary Carroll (1885-1957) on Sept. 20, 1905. Their Children: James Thomas Fulghum; William P. Fulghum; Mary Fulghum (born June 22, 1906. She married Albert L. Menefee on Dec. 16, 1926. Their children: Albert L. Menefee Jr., who married Valere Potter, daughter of Justin Potter; and Margaret Menefee, who married Edward Gillum.) (b) Charles Fulghum was born March 9, 1881, and died unmarried on Sept. 18, 1940. (c) Effie Fulghum was born Dec. 25, 1883, and died June 22, 1946. She married Alfred S. Argyle on April 8, 1919, and had one daughter, Mary Catharine, who is now Mrs. James Short of Franklin, Tennessee. Mary Catherine and James Short have two children, James Short and Ann Short. (d) Maurice Gunn Fulghum was born Dec. 13, 1886, and died Nov. 12, 1950. He married Odelle Mallory of Franklin, Tennessee, on July 26, 1933. Odelle is the granddaughter of Clement Mallory and Melissa Fleming, both members of pioneer Williamson County families. (e) Robert J. Fulghum was born March 19, 1891 near Kingston Springs, Tennessee, and died on March 15, 1926, while on a business trip in Corsicana, Texas. He married Ella Claire Mahony on April 24, 1913. Ella, the daughter of Thomas Mahony and Ella Dawson, was born in Erin, Tennessee, on April 4, 1893, and died in Nashville on April 20, 1958.

Robert and Ella Fulghum had one daughter, Eleanor, who was born in Memphis on Jan. 23, 1915. Eleanor Fulghum married Douglas Crowder of Gallatin, Tennessee, on May 4, 1933. There are two children: Emily Crowder Bunting (Mrs. William Farnum Bunting), presently a graduate student at the University of Michigan, and Dr. Robert Douglas Crowder, the writer of this history and currently Associate Professor of French Literature at North Texas State University.

HISTORICAL ADDRESS BY COL. JOHN A. GARDNER,
Or The Early Times In Weakley County, Giving A Synopsis
Of The Scenes And Incidents For The Past Fifty Years
Delivered at Dresden, Tennessee, July 4, 1876

PIONEER SETTLERS

The settlement of West Tennessee may be said to have commenced about the year 1819. Of course there were a few scattering settlements here before that time. The first settlers around Dresden were John Terrill, Perry Vincent, Dr. Jubilee Rogers, Benjamin Bondurant, Richard Porter, Jephtha and Alfred Gardner, Robert Powell, and a little later Nelson Nailling. Vincent Rust, Claiborne Stone, Thomas Parham, John H. Reavis and others.

Vincent Rust, I am informed by Dr. I. C. Reavis, made the first hogshead of tobacco, in 1835, ever grown in this county, which was sold to R. C. Williams for five dollars per hundred, and hauled to Mills' Point, now Hickman, Kentucky, by Dr. Reavis, in 1836. Mr. George W. Martin tells me that he thinks that his father, Captain William Martin, brought the first tobacco seed to the county, and was the first settler who engaged in growing this crop. He thinks this was as early as 1832 or 1833. This is an interesting fact in view of the great importance the tobacco culture has since attained to in this county.

Among the early settlers on Cane creek, northeast of Dresden, in the vicinity of what is now Palmersville, were Levi Mizell, Joseph Wilson, John Webb, and a few others, who were here before the county was organized. Then came the Ridgeways, Buckleys, Killebrews and Kilgores.

Of the early settlers in the northeast corner of the county between the Middle Fork of the Obion and the Kentucky line, my esteemed friend, John F. Cavitt, Esq., to whose kindness I am indebted for my information in reference to this section of the county, was among the earliest. He settled there on the 20th of March, 1820, before any crop had been made in that part of the county. Henry and John Stevenson and Isaac and William Willingham had preceded him a short time, and each family had erected a cabin to live in, when he arrived. John Rogers moved in with Squire Cavitt. Soon afterwards other immigrants arrived -- namely, Jesse B. Davis, Peter Williams, Masco (?) Austin, Littleton F. Abernathy, and Benjamin Farmer -- the latter of whom settled on Knob creek, and was the third Constable in that district. Of my old friend, Ben Farmer, some very amusing anecdotes were told. It is said that soon after he was elected Constable, having an execution in his hands which he wished to levy on a cow and calf, that he ran down the cow, and rubbed the execution upon her, as the only legal and valid manner of levying it, and being unable to catch the calf, he shook the execution at it, and said, "you, too, calfy."

Samuel McGowan, a Baptist clergyman of Henry county, was the first minister of the Gospel who preached to these adventurous pioneers. Dr. McMorrisson was their first physician.

In 1830 John Cook settled on the Kentucky side of the line, about one half mile west of Boydsville, put up a small stock of goods and got a post office established. Cook died, and Blythe put up a store a half mile east

of Boydsville, and had the post-office there. In the spring of 1832, Abner Boyd, the father of Captain A. M. Boyd, became interested with Blythe in his store. Soon after they dissolved partnership, and Boyd settled at the present site of Boydsville, and laid off the town. Within a few months the village was doing a good deal of business in the way of trade, and soon became celebrated for shooting-matches, cock-fights, horse-racing and other games; and fisticuffs.

John Huggins was the first, L. F. Abernathy the second, and Ben Farmer the third Constable in this district. Joseph Wilson and John Webb were the first Magistrates. When the district was divided, Wm. Wester and John F. Cavitt were chosen the first Magistrates of the new district. Wester served only a short time, and was succeeded by Alexander W. Sprout.

I come now to the northwest corner of the county. Among the earliest settlers in this part of the county was Alexander Paschall, of Carroll county, North Carolina, a noble specimen of industry and honesty from the old North State, who came here about the year 1824. He was followed, from Madison county, Alabama, in 1830, by his son, Jesse M. Paschall, Esq., the father of Dr. G. W. Paschall, of Fulton, Kentucky, to whom I am indebted for these facts, and much other important information. In building a heavy hewed log house, with two rooms, in which Squire Paschall raised his large family, he had to invite his neighbors twelve miles in every direction. He got thirty-two hands, who were two days doing the work, with all their energies highly stimulated by the use of eight gallons of whisky. The earlier settlers in that part of the county were Daniel Lasswell and his three sons, Daniel, Joseph and Peter; Samuel Majors, John and George Horton and Peter Mooney. Some of the later settlers on Richland creek were Reuben and King Clark, Berry Chambers, Snow, Atkins (?), and Stanleys. James Ashly, Bassett A. Beadles and James Drew, in the order in which they are here named, were the first Constables of this district. John Horton was one of the first Magistrates. He was succeeded by J. M. Paschall, who served eighteen years.....

For the information and amusement of the young ladies and gentlemen of the present refined and polished generation, I will relateanecdote, for which, I am indebted to Dr. Paschall. In the early days of which I have been speaking, our ancestors lived in huts and cabins, constructed of rough, unhewn logs. These rude primitive structures were generally floorless, except the earth. They used what was then known as the Forked Deer bedstead, made with but one post, with two augur holes in it, to receive two pieces of timber extending in different directions to cracks in the wall of the house. Resting on a log of the wall, at one end, and on one of the pieces inserted in the post, at the other, clapboards were spread out, in the place of modern slats or springs, on which the straw bed was laid. Under these beds, on the ground, their scanty supply of corn and pumpkins were stored. The pumpkins were used as seats, and when a young man visited a girl to court her, she would roll out a pumpkin for him to sit upon. If it was flat and comfortable, he at once knew he was in favor and would be accepted; but if it was sharp and uneasy, he knew his doom, and discontinued his visits.

On Mud creek, about eight miles west of Dresden, in 1819, our clever fellow-citizen, yet living, Reuben Edmandson, now President of this meeting, and his father-in-law, Mr. Glasgow, settled at a very early day. Dudley Glass, Sr., Levi Clark and Israel Jones, were also early settlers in the same direction. Between Mud creek and the Middle Fork, were Owens, the Parrishes, the Tansils, Thomas Etheridge, the father of the Hon. Emerson Etheridge, A. Clemens, J. W. Rogers and John Jenkins. Between the Middle and South Forks, among the early settlers were Duke Cantrell, M. H. G. Williams,

Wm. Hillis, Alfred Bethel, F. A. Kemp, Calloway Hardin. A little higher up the river, were Robert Mosely, E. D. Dickson, James Hornbeak, John and Geton Bradshaw and Richard Drewry. The civil district extended from the junction of the rivers up to the meridian line and Spring creek. E. D. Dickson was one of the First Magistrates, and Jonathan Fowler, constable. Gilbert Patterson, Esq., an old and highly respected citizen, settled near where Greenfield is now, in 1836, and yet resides there. To him I am indebted for valuable information.

In the southeastern part of the county, and on upper Spring creek, lived Thomas Osborne, Andy Denning, John Brawner. Isaac Crews, the McElroys, McLuskeys and Rogers, and Robert and Jonathan M. Gilbert, the latter of whom is now living in Paris, Capt. James and Alfred Smith, and William Hamilton, all three are yet living. Also, Ned Bucy, Francis Liddle, John O. Neal, and Jim Kennedy. McElroy was the first Constable. Isaac Crews was one of the first Magistrates. Capt. Smith and Wm. Hamilton settled near where they now live, in 1824. Mr. Hamilton tells me he raised his first corn on unfenced land. He says it was not troubled by domestic, but very much destroyed by wild animals. Tilghman Johnson, one of our oldest and best citizens, who now lives in that neighborhood, came to this country in 1819, and, as a chain carrier, assisted in running the Range and Section lines. He first settled near McLemoresville, afterwards Carroll county.

On Thompson's creek, some of the early settlers were John Thomas, Daniel Campbell, Sam Morgan, Elijah Stanley, Daniel Shaw's father, Wm. Gay, John H. Moore, Haydon E. Wells and Samuel Peeples, who is yet living at Gardner. On Lower Cypress, Capt. Job Rogers, E. P. Latham, Carney, the McLeans, the Shultz, the Smarts and the Damrons, settled. On upper Cypress, the Thompsons, Thomas Ross, Mr. Brann, and others. Near Dukedom, were the Cashion, the Winstead and the Beadle families. My information is meagre in respect to this part of the county.....

EARLY HABITS--MANNER OF LIVING, ETC.

The style of living, of the early settlers, was exceedingly plain and primitive....There were no stores, nor saw-mills in the country. They often had to go twenty or thirty miles to a grist-mill. Lumbrick's Mill, on Old Town creek, about thirteen miles from Dresden, on the dirt road to Paris, done all the grinding for the early settlers.....The early supply of salt was brought from "Mill's Point", on horseback, when there were only four men there - John Hanna, George Marr, and Bush & Drobbles, two Dutchmen.....As the wild animals were destroyed, or driven out, the stock of the country increased very rapidly....My brother, Dr. Richard W. Gardner, from 1828 to 1835, frequently owned as many as 1,500 head of hogs, ranging at large.....

PRICE OF LANDS, OCCUPANTS, ETC.

Much of the best lands in this country were entered by North Carolina Military land warrants, and was owned, in large bodies, by non-residents of the State. Much of it had descended to the heirs of the soldier or speculator, who were anxious to sell. The best of these old grants sold at from \$1.50 to \$3.00 per acre. And these low prices continued, with but little change, until about the year 1847. There was also a great deal of vacant land in the "Western District,".....belonging to the Federal Government made subject to "occupant" entry, by the law of the State, on proof of actual settlement.... First settlers generally settled on this vacant land. It was from 20 to 25 years before they obtained their titles.

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NOTE: Surnames appearing in Index without given names or initials are recorded in property descriptions, showing boundary lines, etc. Index also includes names shown in marginal notes, which record transference of property into the late 1830's and 1840's, beyond dates of the OCCUPANT ENTRY BOOK.

PIONEERS OF RED RIVER COUNTY, TEXAS, FROM TENN., KY., AND ARK.

The family of CLAIBORNE WRIGHT, from Carthage, Tennessee, were the first permanent settlers of Red River County, arriving Sept. 5, 1816. Wright's mother, HENRIETTA, was a descendant of WILLIAM CLAIBORNE and ELIZABETH (TRAVIS) CLAIBORNE of Virginia. Wright's young nephews from Tenn. and Ky. followed - JOHN and WYLIE FOWLER in 1817, and later BRADFORD C. and ANDREW JACKSON FOWLER. John was made Indian agent in 1819. Bradford fought in the Texas Revolution in 1836. Andrew was chief justice of Red River County, 1839-40, and in Texas Congress in 1840-41. Another brother, REV. LITTLETON FOWLER (Methodist minister), visited the brothers in 1833. Founder of Clarksville in Red River County was JAMES CLARK, son of BENJAMIN CLARK (Methodist preacher), who had lived for some years in Hempstead County, Ark. (on first grand jury there in 1819; coroner, 1819-23; built first cotton gin 1817; native of N.C.; served in Revolution). GILBERT CLARK, son of Benjamin, was a Methodist preacher in Washington, Ark., 1822-25, and Hot Springs Circuit, 1825-26; moved to Clarksville; judge of probate court, 1842; became Cumberland Presbyterian minister. (Cumberland Presbyterian Church, formed 1833-34 at Shiloh, Texas, was one of oldest congregations in Texas; 1st pastor Rev. Milton Estill; 2nd Samuel Corley, 3rd James Sampson.) Clarksville Female Academy was established in 1840 by ROBERT and MARTHA WEATHERED of Sumner County, Tennessee.
