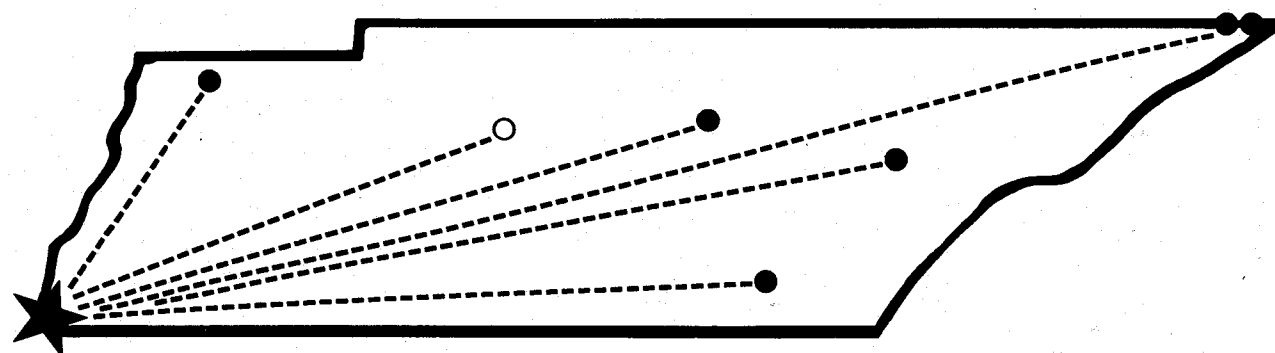

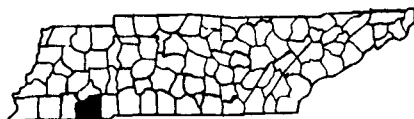

McNairy County was created in 1823, but its earliest marriage records were destroyed in a courthouse fire during the Civil War. These records are the first extant ones. AP. denotes application for a license. No officiant was named.

"A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE STEPHENS FAMILY" - Submitted by Mrs. Jenece Warner,
904 Eighth Avenue, Cleveland, MS 38732

Marcus D. Lafayette STEPHENS, born 9 Nov 1829, wrote this history for his family 14 Feb 1911 and died a few weeks later in Water Valley, MS on 15 Apr 1911. He related the story of the early Stephens, his grandparents' families and gave a detailed account of his experiences during the Civil War along with anecdotes of everyday life in a rural community.

"Our immediate family are the remote off-spring of Samuel Stephens, an Englishman, who came over to America with Lord Bacon, as his private secretary, who located at Jamestown in about 1650." *(Further information is in records of Bacon's Rebellion.)* A short time after Bacon's death, Samuel Stephens died and his English wife married again. He left a family of sons and daughters in the care of Richard Stephens, his eldest son. The known children were Richard, Thomas, Samuel, Dennis and two daughters. When they were banished from the colonies, Richard, the family and several other banished families went up the James River and settled in the hills (near where Lynchburg is now) among the Indians who welcomed them.

Our grandfather, Thomas Stephens, was born c1760. In 1775 he packed his saddle bag with all of his worldly possessions and mounted his horse and started Southwest, landing on the Holstin River in North Carolina territory, now Tennessee, locating at a landing on the Ashville River and engaged in farming. Thomas joined the command of Gen. Shelby in Col. Sevier's brigade of cavalry and took part in the battle of King's Mountain. Since the Indians were unfriendly to the settlers after the Revolutionary War, the settlers petitioned the government to build a fort on the Cumberland River. Grandfather Stephens, having a fine team of horses, was employed by the Government to carry a load of army supplies from Asheville to Fort Nash. Thomas married Martha DAVIS and set out on a convoy of soldiers and wagons for Fort Nash where they landed safely. He entered a tract of land on Trace Creek, three miles Southwest of the fort, where my father, Dennis Stephens, was born 16 May 1796. Their six sons and four daughters were:

1. Dennis - born 16 1796 married Jane HUDSON *(see below)*
2. John - moved to Bambridge (now Centralia), Illinois in 1825
3. William - moved to Marshall Co MS in 1839; married 1840 Linda WALTON in TN and had five daughters: Martha Frances, Mary Ann, Margaret Ann (Mary Ann's twin), Laura Adaline, Johnie who died as a child and Paralee who died young; after William was widowed he married the widow STRICKLAND
4. Alfred - married ? GLENN in Williamson Co TN
5. Thomas - moved to Marshall Co MS and died without children
6. Anderson - Williamson Co TN
7. Sallie - married Solomon BUTTS
8. Bettie - married John HAWKINS; no children
9. Margaret - died as a child
10. Patsey - died as a single adult

Dennis Stephens - born 16 May 1796 TN; married Jane Hudson in 1822 [Ed. Note: a book on Williamson Co TN marriages states that Dennis Stephens married 1 Aug 1822 to Jane Hutson with bondsman, John Hutson]; their children were:

1. Sarah Theresa Jane - born 1825; died 1875 Tunica Co MS; married William H. DANIEL on 14 Feb 1844; he was a widower with four daughters - Eliza, Julia, Lucy and Margaret; William and Theresa had the following children:

3. Marcus D. Lafayette - born Williamson Co TN 9 Nov 1829 and moved in 1838 to Marshall Co MS; died 15 Apr 1911; married 1856 Mary Jane DUFF; he studied medicine in 1852-53 with Dr. R.M. GLOVER; during 1853 he "took lectures" in Louisville, KY and in 1854 located at Banner, Calhoun Co MS to practice medicine; their children were:

- a. Kate - died in infancy
- b. Cleora - died 1874
- c. Fred - born 1863; died 1904
- d. R.L.D. - oldest; born 29 Apr 1858; married Lala M. SUGG; children: Andrew L. born 1 Mar 1894; William Dennis, living in 1911 and Duff who died in infancy
- e. W.J. - born 1 Oct 1866 married Minnie HOUSTON: children: Edward Duff, died before 1911, William James and Robert Houston
- f. Ed L. - born 25 Dec 1868; died unmarried 5 Mar 1942
- g. Mittie T. - born 2 Nov 1872; married John W. SMITHER on 27 Dec 1890; children: Cleora, Robbie Duff and John Marquid, all living 1911 and Julia, Madge and Marie, all dead by 1911
- h. Blanche - born 25 Nov ____; single
- i. Maude - born 1 Jan ____; single

4. Melissa Ann Eliza - married Jerry BIRCH, who was born 10 May 1820 in NC and died Feb 1911; their children were:

- a. Nora Lee - married R.J. THOMPSON: children: William G., a doctor in Enid, MS; Noel, a dentist in Brookhaven, MS who married Dreda LEITCHIE; Shem; and Birch
- b. Ella - married Neutt MATHEWS and had three sons: Earnest, Lafayett, ?

Jane Hudson Stephens, wife of Dennis, was the daughter of John Hudson and Elizabeth SPRATT. Elizabeth was the daughter of Andrew Spratt and Martha BLYTHE. The sixteen children of Andrew and Martha married except James Spratt, a merchant in Charlotte, NC. Martha Blythe's brother, Joseph, was in the Revolutionary War; since he had no wife or children he gave Martha his 5000 acre grant located in Williamson Co TN which Martha and Andrew settled c1790.

John and Elizabeth Hudson had one daughter, Jane, who married Dennis Stephens, and six sons, as follows:

1. William - died Durango, Mexico in 1840 on way to California for gold
2. Andrew - killed in the battle of the Alamo; William and Andrew went with David Crockett in 1835/36)
3. John - drowned on steamer in Alabama River; single
4. James - married ? HILL; a tailor in Columbia, TN; son, Charley
5. Miles - stayed on old Spratt survey; married and raised four sons and three daughters who remained on the Spratt survey
6. Samuel - a tailor in Florence, AL; 1835 married ? DERBY; children: John, died single; Andrew, married in Florence and was a mercantile business partner of Mr. WHITE; Roma, married ? White; David, killed by a runaway horse and died single; Lafayette, died single; and B.F., a Methodist Minister in Pulaski, TN, married and had children.

Marcus D. Lafayette Stephens' account of his Civil War experiences includes one especially interesting episode. He joined a company formed in Sarepta, MS January 1861. He was mustered into state service as a 2nd Lt. 7 Apr 1861 and sent to Corinth, MS where he was assigned to the 17th Regiment. He was soon promoted to the rank of Colonel. Marcus was severely wounded in the right thigh and hip during the battle at Franklin, TN. "A soldier from the ranks of the enemy leaped over the breast-works [which the Rebs had failed to capture] and came to me, saying I fear you are dyeing the blood was spouting from my wound and I was attempting to staunch the blood with my finger. He said this will never do, taking out his knife, cut the tail of my coat off, made a bandage and adjusted it around my leg to staunch the blood, which for the time succeeded. He said to me, rest easy a moment and I will remove you behind our breast-works, he soon came back with a litter and three other men. . ." They delivered him to Col. Stewart of the 169th Illinois Regiment who said "let me send you further back, if your men charge again they will kill you with their stray bullets." There was an attack during which he was moved across the river in an ambulance, but then laid on the roadside. In the confusion of the enemy's hasty retreat, he was left on the "hard frozen" ground and soon became very cold. "As they passed me some one cursed and abused me, others spoke kindly to me and one soldier said to me, 'you will freeze here before morning'. . .he pulled from his soldiers a pair of heavy blankets and placed them over me. I asked him his name. My name is H.A. BARR, my home is at Willow Springs, Nebraska. . . 'God bless you.' Soon another soldier passed and said 'you will freeze here if not protected from that cold wind' and placed boxes of crackers and other army supplies around me to protect me from the North wind." Once again, another soldier saw my plight and gathered some kindlingwood, split boxes and made a good fire at my feet and passed on. To these three I no doubt owe my life. At dawn Maj. PULLIAN, of my regiment, found me; I was moved to Col. McGAVVOCK's residence which had been converted into a temporary hospital. One doctor wanted to amputate my leg but I made Dr. ROBERTS promise not to. I told them I had an uncle living five miles away where I could remain until I got well. As we passed the family graveyard where my grandparents, Hudson, were buried, they were burying five Spratt family members. He had rested at his uncle's house a few days when his Adjutant, Ed McAFEE, came to inform him that Gen. HOOD's army was retreating from Nashville and the enemy would soon be there. McAfee wanted to know if Col. Stephens was able to travel. "I stuffed some wool in my pants leg, and mounted my horse with assistance and turned my face toward my dear old home." As they traveled about 15 miles per day, he and his servant, Marse FAYETT, were given food and shelter by many kind people along the way, one was his uncle, Samuel HUDSON, of Florence. He survived his wound but walked with a crutch.

WHAT HAPPENED TO ONE TENNESSEAN - Submitted by Lucy Shull Stevens,

Where are you going to find records of your ancestors and how long will it take? We often ponder these questions, but the following story should make you hope; never give up and keep searching. Lucy Stevens relates the following:

My Mother never travelled anywhere that she did not find some place (usually a Court House or Library) where she could manage a little genealogical research. She and my stepfather were en route to El Paso, TX to visit her only sister when they stopped overnight near Bolivar, TN. She prevailed upon her husband to give her time to look at the marriage records. We were trying to verify the marriage location of my great grandfather, Martin Hadley SHULL, born 23 Aug 1811 in Mississippi Territory, and his wife, Matilda NORRIS, born 30 Jul 1819 Tennessee. We knew the birth and marriage dates from the family Bible. There in Bolivar, TN was a license issued to one Martin H. SHELL and Matild Norris on 24 Feb 1834.

Supposedly, this couple had left Hardeman Co TN with a group of people migrating to Texas. I had not been able to pick them up on the census list and only vaguely knew that they had probably died in Sabine Parish, LA. My grandfather's obituary said that he, William Levi Shull, was born 23 Apr 1840 in Trinity Co TX. Since my uncle had written the obit, I knew he would not have given the location unless Grandpa had told him.

Years passed, and a cousin sent me a picture of my great grandfather with my grandfather, grandmother and six of their eight children. We determined it was made in 1896. A local county paper in Sabine Parish was publishing "Pictures of the Past" in 1984-85, so I sent the negative to them, and named each person therein, whom they married, and where they were buried and their parents' names. I stated that I did not know where either Martin Hadley or Matilda Norris Shull were buried, but presumably in Sabine Parish.

Some time after the picture was published, I received a letter from a man of Spanish descent who lived in Sabine Parish. He stated that he and his wife had been walking in the woods one day in 1965 (twenty years before!) and had come upon a small burying ground with three or four graves, only one of which had a headstone. It read Matild Norris, d. 15 Oct 1861. I was so excited. Last October, I flew to Louisiana and attended a Homecoming at the country church where my father and grandparents are buried, and this man took me and a cousin out to see the grave site. It was a long way from any present road, although tradition has it that near these graves was a road once called "the Old Texas Road." What a thrill!

HAYDON WELLS - TENNESSEE PIONEER - Contributed by Mrs. Clara Hamlett Robertson,
303 West Bank #2, Salisbury, NC 28144

Mrs. Robertson is the daughter of James Morrison HAMLETT and Maude CLIFTON of Clarks-ville, Montgomery Co TN. Haydon WELLS (1744-cl820) is her father's maternal great great grandfather. James M. Hamlett's mother, Susan Elizabeth MORRISON, was the daughter of first cousins, both named Morrison. One of them is believed to be the daughter of Josiah Morrison and Nancy Wells who married in 1807 when Nancy was just 13 years old and Josiah was 19. Nancy was the daughter of Haydon's son, Robert Wells.

Family Gatherings (continued)

Haydon was born in Overwharton Parish, Stafford Co VA 9 Sep 1744. He was both a surveyor and a millwright - trades which were valued in pioneer Tennessee. Mrs. Robertson believes his wife was Margaret DRURY. Haydon Wells and Margaret recorded a deed of sale of negroes to William CONDRA in Montgomery Co TN 13 Dec 1798 and earlier in 1794. Two of their sons are named in deeds: Haydon to son, Robert Wells, 200 A on McAdoo Creek of his father's preemption, Montgomery Co TN 16 Aug 1793, and Benjamin Drury Wells is named in Davidson Co TN 20 Oct 1810: "Haydon Wells and son, Benjamin, both of Washington Co MS, party of the 3rd part."

It is also believed he was Methodist since, as executor of Gen. Winchester's will, he was given authority to disperse certain assets to the Methodist Church. His granddaughter, Nancy Wells Morrison, and her family were Methodists in Salem Community of Montgomery Co; and one grandson, Henry Clay Morrison, became Bishop, serving 1898-1919 with his office in Atlanta, GA.

Haydon Wells' signature is large, distinctive and easily read. It appears on the Resolutions signed at Nashborough 13 May 1780 which were sent to the North Carolina Legislature and on the 1817 document to the U.S. Congress requesting that the part of the Mississippi Territory (which later became the State of Alabama) which was drained by the Tombigbee River south to Mobile Bay and the Gulf of Mexico. . . be excluded from the portion under consideration as part of the proposed new State of Mississippi, drained by the Mississippi River.

According to a new book titled 1770-1780 Census of the Cumberland Settlements: Davidson, Sumner and Tennessee Counties (In What is Now Tennessee) by Richard Carlton FULCHER. 1987., on page 128 the following account of Haydon Wells is given - "Wells, Heydon (variously, Aydon, Headon) - came overland with the Heaton party arriving at the French Lick, Dec. 24, 1779: Signer of the Cumberland Compact, May, 1780: Helped build Heaton's Station, completed in the spring of 1782: Member of the Committee of the Cumberland Association, Jan., 1783: Served on the first Grand Jury, Oct. 7, 1783: Listed in the North Carolina Preemption Act of 1784, as one of the settlers on the Cumberland in 1780, who stayed and defended the Settlements, and entitled to 640 acres without any price to be paid to the public: He was a one-eyed man: 1787 Davidson Co. tax roll with 1 taxable: Summoned for Davidson Co jury duty on the Superior Court of the Law and Equity, May, 1789: North Carolina land grants."

Haydon Wells' brothers founded Wells Station near Shelbyville, KY between Louisville and Frankfort about 1775. One of their sons was named after his uncle as well as Haydon's son, Robert, had a son named Hayden E. Wells. Haydon built the first grist mill at Nashborough in 1780/81; constructed the first log Court House in Clarks-ville, TN and was a surveyor whose name is found on many pages of early land grants and deed books, especially in early Montgomery Co TN.

JAMES W. BLACK BIBLE - Contributed by Mrs. Margaret Norvell Sinclair,

James W., William and Nelson BLACK came to Tennessee from "Carolina". Their father [James R. Black?] had twelve sons. He was from Grenauch, Scotland and a shipwright by trade; in 1820 he was in Mecklenburg Co NC.

James W. Black was born 23 Dec 1816 and died 5 Dec 1861. His first marriage was (by family tradition) to the sister of Nelson Black's wife. They had two children:

1. Sarah L. married Rev. WEBB and lived near Friendship, TN. She died in Atlanta, GA in the 1920's.
2. Sterling Monroe married Fayette Co TN Eugenia E. BURROUGHS. He was a private in Co. I., 12th Cavalry, CSA.

James W. Black's second marriage was 9 May 1848 to Nancy Comer ALSTON who was born 22 Aug 1829. She was the daughter of Alfred Alston and Nancy COMER who came from Peak, NC to Fayette Co TN. Their children were:

3. William Alston - born 12 Feb 1849
4. Marcilar Monteray - born 7 Aug 1850; married Joe F. PARK in Friendship, TN
5. James Alfred - born ? Aug 1852; lived in Arkansas
6. Winfield Livingston - born 7 May 1854; died 1943 Memphis, TN; married in Fayette Co TN first to Sarah Jane SMITH and second to Harriet STAFFORD
7. Mary Elizabeth (Bettie) - born 7 May 1856 (her Bible states birth as 6 Apr); married first, Col. John W. EVANS (she was 18 and he was 62); married second, James Harvey NORVELL; both marriages were in Crockett Co TN
8. Thomas Oliver - born 25 Jun 1858; married Sarah Frances EVANS in Sebastian Co AR
9. Martha Eliza - born 26 Sep 1860; died 25 Aug 1861

These Blacks, who usually worked for the railroad, went to Arkansas and Texas with the railroad. James W. Black was kicked by a mule and had a leg amputated before he died; the Fayette Co TN Court appointed guardians for his children

William Black, brother of James W., was married first in Humphreys Co TN to Jane TEAS and married second in Fayette Co TN to Arabella ROSS. An article on his son, Robert J., in Goodspeed, states that the Teas were from Virginia. Robert J. married Frances M. SOMERVELL of Tipton Co TN. Another son, William F., married Salli I. COPPEDGE at Stanton Station, Haywood Co TN. He and his descendants lived in these Tennessee Counties: Fayette, Shelby, Haywood and Humphreys.

Nelson L. Black, brother of James W., married 1839 Mecklenburg Co NC to Sarah B. LAWSON. He appears on the 1840 and 1850 census list for Shelby Co TN at Raleigh but was not on the 1860 census list. He was received into the Raleigh Presbyterian Church from Rocky River Presbyterian Church, NC. Another brother of James W. Black is Hampton Black.

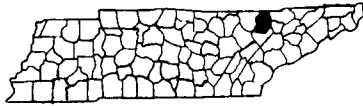

BAUGUS, BRIANT 16 Jun 1835 Recorded 3 Aug 1835 He leaves a tract of land known as Brown's tract containing 980 acres bound by the old state (Winchester) line on the south and Thomas McAns (An's) occupant on the west. Briant names sons, Jack, Briant, Vincent and Franklin Baugus, and a daughter, Nancy, wife of John MORE. Executors: George CLARK and Dr. J.M.M. CORNELIUS. He signs with his mark and it is witnessed by George Clark and William RENICK.

BELL, RUBEN H. 20 Oct 1830 Proven Jan 1831 He bequeaths to Hiram Bell SMITH, son of Solomon, 50 acres in State of Caintuckey, County of Culwill [Caldwell] joining WALDEN and LOFTUS's land, Warrant #13613 Plat No. 432. He also gives to Alexander OAN/OWEN/ORNE, son of William, 50 acres adjacent to Walden, Warrant #13614 Plat No. 430. Ruben states that "no money due me in Shelby or anywhere should be collected by my executors except notes against William COOK of KY for \$20 which I gave Ruben ROBERS/ROLEN, Esq. of Culwell Co KY, town of Prince, to collect and use for his own use." He instructs James WARREN, Exe., of Shelby Co TN, after paying himself and all estate debts, to give any balance which is left to "poor distressed strangers passing through the country as well as my clothing." Further instructions read: "if Solomon Smith shall order and faithfully commit my saddle bags and the contents thereof and the five bags of notes, without ever opening or suffering them to be opened, to the flames and burn them up, that my executor give him my trunk and the contents, my saddle and my spurs, if not, the executor is to sell them and give the money to distressed poor as above." Witnessed by George (X) DEASON and James L. VAUGHAN.

BELL, WILLIAM 4 Jul 1836 Proven Aug 1836 He states that he lives in Memphis, but was late of North Carolina. William wills to his friend, Marcus B. WINCHESTER, his black people: Sarah and four children - Adam, Joseph, Mary and Caroline; Barbara and her infant, Lucy, in full faith that he forthwith will send them to a free state and there emancipate them and give them their liberty and freedom. He also gives to MBW all his cash and money owed to apply to the removal of same. William leaves \$500 to his Mother from the money due him in North Carolina. MBW is executor. He signs his will which was witnessed by Wyatt CHRISTIAN, Arch McLEAN and Levi PRESCOTT.

BROOKS, JOSEPH 22 May 1832 Proven Oct 1834 He mentions his wife, Jeamina Brooks, and daughter, Sarah C., and makes reference to "all my children." Executors are sons, Henry and Lewis Brooks, and his friend, Andrew REMBERT. Witnesses: A. Rembert and Thomas DOUGLAS.

COCKRAN, LYNCH 8 May 1836 Proven Aug 1836 He leaves his entire estate to his wife, Nancy, with a sufficient portion appropriate to support and educate her son,

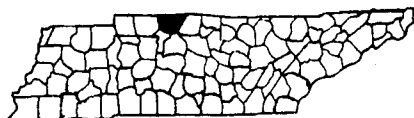

FRANCIS ASBURY'S TRAVELS IN TENNESSEE

True to his "methodical" heritage, Bishop Francis Asbury planned the year 1803 along the same pattern he had formed for his travel - winter in the south, and spring and summer in New England, leaving the western circuit for fall and his return to the south. By September he was crossing a corner of present-day West Virginia into the new state of Ohio. This territory had been admitted to the Union on March 1st of that year with a population of about 100,000, but in 1796 it was still a wilderness. In that year the Federal Government had granted to Ebenezer Zane a tract of land on the Muskingum River on the condition that he open a road across southern Ohio. Asbury remarked "...it is but four years since Zane opened the road for the general government through the wilderness so lately called, and now there are the towns of Marietta at the mouth of the Muskingum, of about one thousand houses; Cincinnati, containing as many; Hamilton, of five hundred houses; and many others whose names are scarcely fixed."

The Asbury party crossed the Ohio River and rode to the Kentucky Conference, which was held in Harrison County, not far from Cynthiana, and by October 8th, the bishop was again headed down the Wilderness Road toward East Tennessee. The ministers accompanying him were McKendree, Garratt, Douthet and Granade.

14 Oct 1803 - *"We came to Hunt's at Claibornes court house (Taxewell) and next day reached Martin Stubblefield's."*

The Stubblefield brothers, Thomas, Joseph and Martin, lived at County Line between Bean Station and Morristown. Martin was later killed by his runaway team in Cincinnati, where he was buried. Asbury's observations continue:

"What a road we have passed! certainly the worst on the whole continent, even in the best weather; yet bad as it was, there were four or five hundred crossing the rude hills whilst we were. I was powerfully struck with the consideration that there were at least as many thousand emigrants annually from east to west; we must take care to send preachers after these people...A man who is well mounted will scorn to complain of the roads when he sees men, women, and children, almost naked, paddling bare-foot and bare-legged along, or labouring up the rocky hills, whilst those who are best off have only a horse for two or three children to ride at once. If these have little or nothing to eat, it is no extraordinary circumstance; and not uncommon to encamp in the wet woods after night - in the mountains it does not rain, but pours...I too have my sufferings...no room to retire to - that in which you sit common to all, crowded with women and children, the fire occupied by cooking...solitude not to be found, unless you choose to run out into the rain...but the people are amongst the kindest souls in the world. But kindness will not make a crowded log cabin, twelve feet by ten, agreeable; without are cold and rain; and within, six adults and as many children, one of which is all motion; the dogs too must sometimes be admitted. On Saturday, at Felix Ernest's, I found that amongst my other trials, I had taken the itch; and considering the filthy houses and filthy beds I have met with in coming from the Kentucky Conference, it is perhaps strange that I have not caught it twenty times..."

24 Oct 1803 - *"we came off in earnest; refreshed at Isaiah Harrison's, and continued on to the Paint mountain, passing the road newly made, which makes the road down to Paint Creek much better. I lodged with Mr. Neilson, who treated me like a minister, a Christian, and a gentleman."*

From this point, Asbury entered North Carolina. Is it any wonder that he did not return to Tennessee and Kentucky until 1805!

On October 25th, 1805 he was again entering Tennessee on the Wilderness Road and remarked "the road was bad...Our carriage had nearly upset. I am decided

to take the Cumberland path hereafter..." The party rested a day at the Stubblefield's, then the diary continues:

17 Oct 1805 - "We crossed Main Holston and came into Tennessee, and put into Colonel Conaway's, Little Nolachiskey; we rested here on Friday (18 Oct). At Moses Ellis's, on Saturday, we saw Moses Black and his wife - he about forty, and she fifteen; such are the wise contracts Methodist preachers sometimes make. Sunday ...we passed Quorton's ferry upon Great Nolachucky. In crossing the Paint Mountain, on Monday, we rode up, and walked down; and I sprained my ankle."

So ended another dreary trip across the mountains. The notes in the 1958 edition say that Moses Black was serving the Nollichucky Circuit. He was admitted to the conference in 1796 and located in 1806 but was readmitted in 1808. He died while serving Carter's Valley Circuit in Hawkins County, TN on 10 Feb 1809.

Almost another year passed, and Asbury returned to Tennessee, this time entering from Virginia.

2 Sep 1806 - "I was weak, but attended the appointment of the stationed preacher, A. Houston...next day I rode thirty miles over to Edward Cox's."

4 Sep 1806 - "I lodged at the widow Lewis's, on Beaver Creek."

6 Sep 1806 - "I preached at Charles Helton's, upon Main Holston..."

7 Sep 1806 - "We crossed Holston at the mouth of Watauga: the Sabbath I do not usually employ in travelling - sometimes when I fall in with the circuit preachers. I was very close in my discourse at Dingworth's...I lodged at William Nelson's an ancient home and stand for Methodists and Methodist preaching..."

20 Sep 1806 - "The Western Conference commenced its sitting...The Mississippi missionary preachers could not be spared, they thought, from their work, and therefore did not come...I preached a funeral discourse on the death of our dear friend Whatcoat..."

The notes say that this conference was held at Ebenezer meetinghouse in Greene County, and that Bishop Richard Whatcoat had died on 5 Jul 1806 in the home of Richard Bassett at Dover, Delaware. So, another year passed.

As Asbury grew older, the entries in his journal grew shorter. His Tennessee entry for 1807 covers less than a week, but this visit did not include a Conference meeting. Moreover, the Asbury party travelled over roads well-known and already described in the journal, namely the Wilderness Road from Kentucky and the roads across Greene County to North Carolina. After remarking about the "serious want of water, generally, in the western lands", the journal entry reads:

12 Oct 1807 - "We had a heavy ride to Holston, forty miles. We stopped with Martin Stubblefield."

13 Oct 1807 - "Tuesday we rested; and it may be allowed, considering our six days ride through heat, great heat and drought..."

16 Oct 1807 - "We reached Wamping's. I suffered much today; but an hour's warm bath for my feet relieved me considerably."

17 Oct 1807 - "On Saturday we rode to Killian's."

One might wonder if the great drought referred to here could have caused a general migration further west, or northwest into the new state of Ohio. The notes of the 1958 edition give us no clue as to who "Wamping" might be, but he must have lived in Greene County, because the entry of 17 Oct 1807 appears under the heading of North Carolina.

In 1808 Bishop Asbury entered Tennessee from south central Kentucky, the cave area of Warren County, near Bowling Green. This year he would spend a month attending a conference and travelling across the Cumberland to East Tennessee.

23 Sep 1808 - "Friday evening brought us up at brother Porter's, from Maryland, now of Warren County. On Saturday we came upon the camp with Bishop

McKendree. On Sunday we had preaching as usual...We came no farther than Woodard's on Monday."

The Warren County referred to above must be the one in Kentucky, because Asbury's party had just come from the Green River area of Kentucky, through Warren County and on to Nashville. McKendree had been elected Bishop at the General Conference held at Baltimore in May and was en route to the Western Conference to be held at the home of Green Hill in Williamson County, TN.

27 Sep 1808 - "...we passed through Nashville. This town has greatly improved in eight years. There are several valuable houses built, an elegant court house, and a college. We put in at Green Hill's, Williamson County."

Green Hill's home, Liberty Hill, was located near present Brentwood; the church he built nearby was also called Liberty Hill. This was McKendree's "home conference" where he had been presiding Elder; it was the first conference where he presided as a bishop. Here he first introduced the "cabinet" of Presiding Elders as participants in the work of making the appointments of the preachers, a strange and not entirely pleasing innovation to Asbury.

1 Oct 1808 - "I began conference...Our conference was a camp meeting, where the preachers ate and slept in tents. We sat six hours a day, stationed eighty-three preachers, and all was peace...We made a regulation respecting slavery: it was that no member of society, or preacher, should sell or buy a slave unjustly, inhumanly or covetously; the case, on complaint, to be examined for a member by the quarterly meeting; and for a preacher an appeal to an annual conference. Where guilt was proved the member to be expelled. The families of the Hills, Sewalls, and Cannon were greatly and affectionately attentive to us."

8 Oct 1808 - "We came rapidly to Stone's River, and thence to Crane's..."

9 Oct 1808 - "At the meeting house I preached...I called on Hardy Hunt."

On his way to the Holston country, Asbury crossed Stones River and proceeded by way of the present Lebanon and Carthage. Henry Boehm, who had been appointed to travel with Asbury, states in his Reminiscences, Historical and Biographical, of Sixty-Four Years in the Ministry (1865) "Everywhere the old and the new bishops were objects of interest, and their appearance hailed with joy. On Monday we reached Dr. Henry Tooley's. This a family of note, and their house one of the best of homes. Here we rested and refitted and prepared to climb the mountains and to penetrate the wilderness."

12 Oct 1808 - "The rain caught us on Wednesday, and fell on us with little intermission until we got to our home at Shaw's in Carthage. On Thursday evening I came in very unwell to Johnson's. We had not above fifty travellers in company! At Hailey's next night, we were not so crowded and did better. There is order observed under this roof. We breakfasted at S.W. Point on Saturday, and then hastened on to Winton's...I preached on the Sabbath at Winton's Chapel...after preaching we crossed Holston and rode ten miles to meet the people at John Saffle's."

This segment of the journey eastward was somewhat familiar to the "old bishop", for it was the same route he had traveled in 1802, but some of the names of the settlers are different. Shaw at Carthage was an old friend, but Johnson was a new name here. The Rhea map locates Johnston's Stand at the point where Overton, Fentress and Morgan Counties met in 1832, which appears to be somewhere within the triangle formed by present-day Monterey, Mayland and Plateau in Putnam and Cumberland Counties. Perhaps this is the place where the Asbury party stopped. Hailey is not identified, but he lived between Crossville and Kingston, if not in Kingston. John Winton was also an old friend (see A.N., Vol. 34, No. 3). The notes say that John Saffle lived near a small church close to Middle Settlement in Blount County, which is the oldest church in that county.

17 Oct 1808 - *"We started in the rain on Monday to Maryville, called upon Mark Moore, and continued to Esquire Black's and lodged."*

18 Oct 1808 - *"Tuesday, came to Mitchell Porter's, on Pigeon River; Wednesday rain, Thursday, rain; we crossed the river twice...On Friday James Riggan came twenty miles. breasting the rains and plunging through the swollen streams, to see me...We started away on Saturday, wade or swim, foul or fair, across the east forks of Little and Great Pigeon; the waters were full enough."*

Mark Moore had joined the conference in 1786 and was alternately a local and a traveling preacher until his final location in 1820. At this time he was a local preacher living near Maryville, TN. Squire Black lived between Maryville and Sevierville. Mitchell Porter was host to Asbury on 1 Nov 1802.

23 Oct 1808 - *"Sunday, at O'Haver's a camp meeting had been appointed by the preachers and people. Bishop McKendree and brother Boehm spoke, as well as brother Blackman and myself. Brother Bowman spoke at night...Our party came away to George Wells's. On Tuesday we rode twenty miles to the Warm Springs, and next day reached Buncombe..."*

John O'Haver was an old friend of Asbury's, but the preachers Bowman and Blackman are not identified. George Wells evidently lived twenty miles west of the Tennessee/North Carolina line where Warm Springs is located. The reference to Buncombe refers to Asheville, NC. While he was in Asheville, Bishop Asbury stayed with Henry Erwin, "a chief man." Erwin was born in Virginia in 1773 and died in Bedford County, Tennessee in 1833. He went to North Carolina in 1790 and was a merchant and innkeeper at Wilkesboro. He represented Wilkes County in the House of Commons in 1800 and was the first postmaster of Asheville.

In his journal Asbury commented "Henry Boehm went to Pigeon Creek to preach to the Dutch." Boehm had left after the camp meeting at O'Haver's campground in Cocke County, TN and had made a detour to preach to the German-speaking people on the Pigeon River of western North Carolina.

Once more the aging bishop completed his round of duties to the Western District and headed south for the winter.

By 1809, the camp meetings had grown in popularity and fervor; Asbury listed four in the Muskingum District of Ohio, and seventeen in the Miami District. Indiana District also held seventeen meetings. After completing the Ohio Conference, the traveling preachers and both bishops crossed Kentucky; Bishop McKendree and Thomas Lasley turned southwest to the Cumberland District, while Asbury and Henry Boehm took the Wilderness Road to Cumberland Gap and the Holston country.

19 Oct 1809 - *"Came away on Thursday across Powell's and Clinch Rivers, and reached Cheek's for the night...We crossed Holston at Marshall's ford on Saturday. Squire Read has built a neat pine chapel in a short time. We lodged with him."*

Mr. Cheek is not identified, but Squire Read was Phelps Read, whose chapel was located south of Marshall's ford and two miles east of Morristown, TN.

22 Oct 1809 - *"Sabbath. I gave them a discourse on Rom. xii, 6-20. Pattison, Stier and Boehm followed...I spoke at Benjamin Van Pelt's on Monday...at Warrensburg next day...We dined with the elders of the house of Conway, and lodged with the only son, Thomas Conway. Preached at O'Haver's chapel on Wednesday. Dined and came on to friend Ellis's. We suppose we have made three hundred and forty miles since we left Cincinnati...I preached at Harrison's chapel..."*

Of the three ministers who were traveling with Asbury, two were assigned to Tennessee: William Pattison was serving Nolichucky Circuit, and Frederick Stier was Presiding Elder of the Holston District. Henry Boehm, of course, was assigned to travel with Bishop Asbury. Van Pelt's was on Lick Creek in Greene County (see 28 May 1790), and Warrensburg was not far away, at the juncture of Little Chucky and

Nolichucky Rivers, still in Greene County. Henry Conway was the head of a notable family; two of his daughters married sons of Gov. John Sevier. O'Haver, Ellis and Harrison were old friends. Harrison's chapel was on the south side of Nolichucky in Greene County. This route was the same one Asbury had used for so many years; surely there were minor changes, but few choices could be offered in such a rugged terrain. New settlers heard his preaching, but it was with the old and true friends that he stopped.

Two of these old friends were hosts to Bishop Asbury and his aide, Henry Boehm, when they returned to Tennessee in 1810. Accompanied by Bishop McKendree and James Gwinn, they were entering Middle TN from the south-central route in Kentucky.

14 Nov 1810 - *"Thursday, a damp heavy ride brought us in about three o'clock to James Gwinn's...The advantages of being on horseback are that I can better turn aside to visit the poor, I can get along more difficult and intricate roads, I shall save money to give away to the needy, and lastly, I can be more tender to my poor, faithful beast. Friday, rested, fasted, read, wrote letters. Saturday, visited James McKendree, lately from Virginia.*

James Gwinn was a preacher who lived near Fountain Head in Sumner County, TN. He was a pioneer and a chaplain in Andrew Jackson's army at the Battle of New Orleans. One of his sons, Wm M. Gwinn, became a member of the U.S. Senate. James McKendree was the brother of Bishop William McKendree. He also lived in Sumner County, as did his father.

18 Nov 1810 - *"Sabbath, I rode to Gwinn's Chapel - a nice building. Behind it the cabins and the ground make a charming square for a camp meeting. Monday, we had a damp muddy ride to friend Haines's. His wife was surprised - she recollected me. How frequently we find our wandering sheep in traveling!...Lodged with John McGee. Tuesday to Dr. Tooley's. Wednesday, a ride of thirty miles brought us to Shaw's. Thursday, fifteen miles to breakfast at Quarles's; twenty-five miles to supper at Elder Terry's. Friday, to the Crab Orchard; thence to Major Hailey's. Saturday, to Kingston, thirteen miles; thence to Winton's twenty miles."*

This paragraph in the Journal outlines a week of the bishop's life. Some of the people he stayed with were old friends, but Haines, Quarles, Elder Terry and Major Hailey seem to be new hosts. Asbury must have known the Haines family in some other location, but at this time they were located between Fountain Head in Sumner County and Dixon Springs in Smith County. From Shaw's near Carthage, the party seemed to travel Highway 70N to its junction with Highway 70 near Crossville and Kingston. Note that this is the first time South West Point is referred to as Kingston. Winton's is at Muddy Creek, near present Martel, 4 miles from Lenoir City, in Loudon County.

25 Nov 1810 - *"Sabbath. I preached at Winton's...a damp, cold, dreary rough ride brought us very hungry to Joseph Black's, where man and beast were fed, and kindly entertained. Tuesday we came to dinner to father Obadiah Fowler's, and then pushed on to Porter's. Snow most of the day...Thursday we were in doubt whether we should take the old or the new route; we took Mahon's road and got along pretty well, thirty miles to the gate; the woman was sick, but the girls of the house were attentive and polite at Mr. Mahon's."*

From Winton's in Loudon County, the party pressed on toward the east to Maryville and beyond to Little River, near which Joseph Black lived, and to Fowler's on the west side of Little Pigeon River near Sevierville. Mitchell Porter lived three miles south of Sevierville on present Highway 71, between Sevierville and Gatlinburg, near Porter's Chapel. The place is now called Zion Cemetery.

Mahon's Road approximated present Highway 73 from Gatlinburg to Cosby, Cocke County, TN. The Mahon home stood at the point referred to as "the gate" where

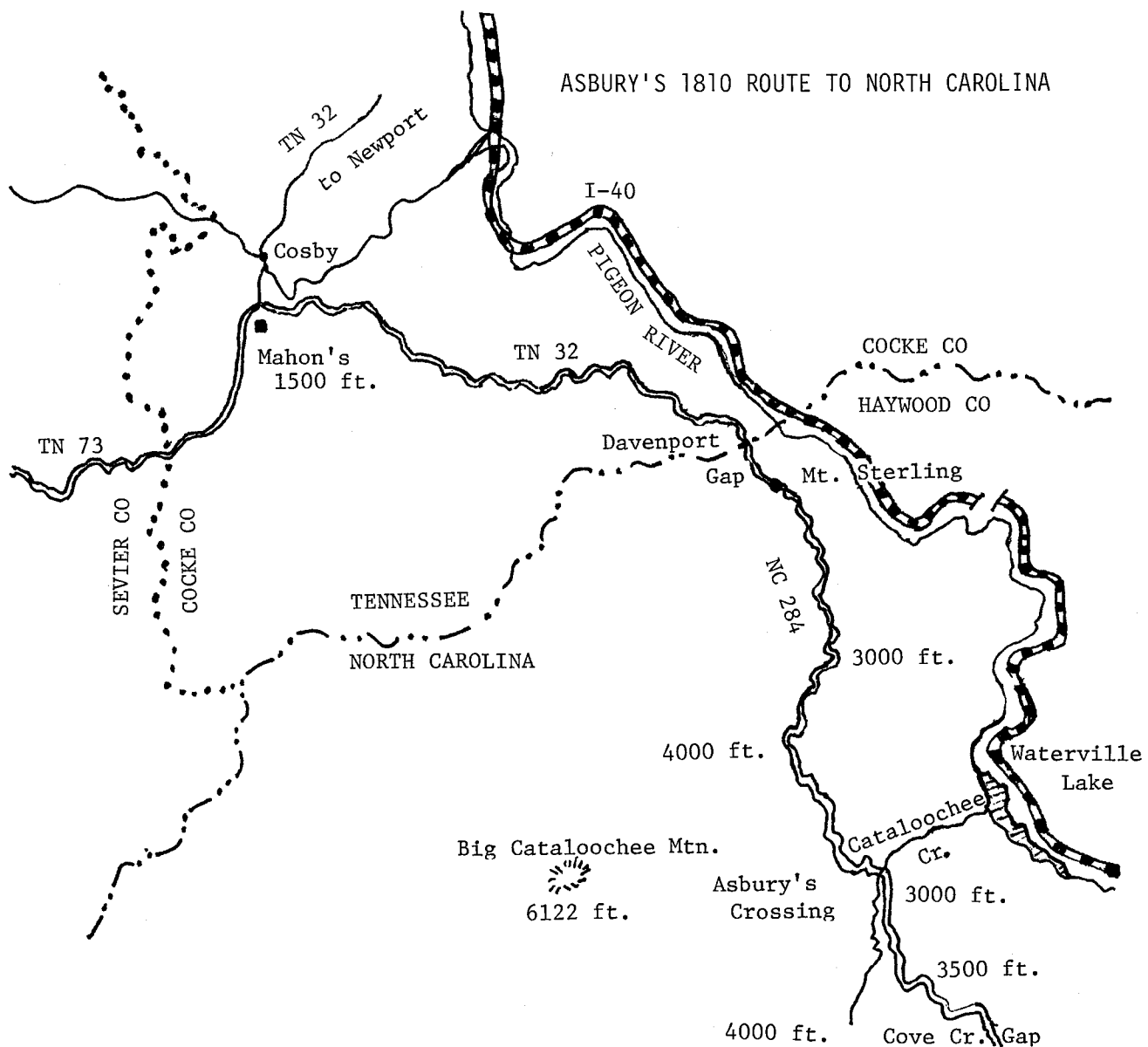

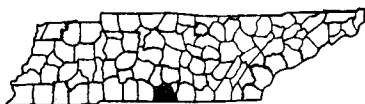
the road from Newport intercepted. It was a toll gate; here Asbury and his party began to ascend the mountains.

30 Nov 1810 - "Friday, our troubles began at the foaming, roaring stream, which hid the rocks. At Cataloochee I walked over a log. But O, the mountain - height after height, and five miles over! After crossing other streams, and losing ourselves in the woods, we came in about nine o'clock at night to Vater Shuck's. What an awful day! Saturday, December 1. Last night I was strongly afflicted with pain. We rode twenty-five miles to Buncombe."

Once again the ailing bishop had crossed the Blue Ridge Mountains. Today a super-highway curves its serpentine way across the Tennessee-North Carolina line, but in 1810 men on horseback led horses across rocky, treacherous streams, even in December snowstorms, following the aboriginal Cataloochee trail.

According to the compiler, this is a "county-by-county catalogue of existing records, which, for the most part, are available at the Tennessee State Library and Archives in Nashville, Tennessee, or through your local Branch Genealogical Library of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints." Examination confirms that extensive and detailed listings are given for each county along with the date of its creation, the county seat, the parent county or territory, and precise dates of coverage of the various records. Gibson County, formed from the Western District in 1823, is bordered by Carrol, Crockett, Dyer, Obion, Madison and Weakley Counties. The abstracts offered here include: date of survey, warrant, and grant; number of grant and warrant; owner's name; number of acres in grant; location of grant; volume and page number of the original record. According to the compiler, most of the information was taken from pedigree charts submitted to the publisher's "Family Group Sheet Exchange" during the last quarter of 1986. Each of the above volumes contains about 20,000 names. EDS

According to the author, this second edition of his 1978 work has undergone considerable revision and expansion. This is a mammoth work. Obviously the result of a vast amount of painstaking effort, it is, Mr. White tells us, "principally a genealogy of the Ayres, Blackwell, Hanes, Houston, Eldridge, Letcher, Thompson, Rushing and Hooper families and their allied families from earliest Colonial times until the present." Descendants settled in Tennessee, North and South Carolina, Illinois, Missouri, Texas and California with surnames of Poland, Emert, Nave, Hickerson, Evans, Marcum, Higgins, Seal, Davenport, Cummings, Elkins, Milligan, Gassaway, Huffman, Hoffman and Dillard. Abstracts and transcriptions of many records--wills, estate sales, land records, guardian bonds, marriages, military records--are presented for documentation. Interesting chapter titles include "From English Royalty - . . .", ". . . To Texas Revelry (Myra Maybelle Shirley, alias Belle Starr)" and "Discoverer of Phosphate - William N. Shirley." JYA

Containing approximately 19,000 tombstones from 138 cemeteries, this book includes, in addition to the alphabetical lists of cemeteries, a comprehensive index of surnames. For added researcher convenience, names of those interred in each cemetery are presented in alphabetical order. The compilers were challenged in preparing this work by neglected cemeteries--undergrowth, broken and sunken stones. Names of cemeteries are listed as indicated on TVA quadrangle maps; but, as less than two thirds of the county's cemeteries are shown on those maps, the most commonly used name is listed in many instances. JYA

Indexes to these three volumes comprise a total of more than 12,500 names--all connected by blood or marriage to someone of the Espy-Espey surname. To collect, organize and document such a vast array of data mandates dedication, skill and determination beyond the ordinary meaning of those terms. The first four chapters offer an easy-to-follow connection of each indexed surname to the focal progenitor, Josiah, son of Hugh Espy. The authors have catalogued, verified and published information painstakingly gathered over many years from numerous contacts. Organization is indicated by volume and chapter titles; quality is evident upon examination of the volumes. A superb work, masterfully organized, expertly presented. JCH

Copies produced by this first printing are limited in number, and no subsequent printing is planned. However, Volume II in the series is anticipated for publication next year. JYA

Hoovel and his wife, Sophia Holden, is a separate section for each of their children with all known descendants. A photograph section, as well as much biographical and historical material, rounds out the genealogical data. AE

This book honors Texas on its 150th birthday. Expertly compiled and informative, it views history through the eyes of those who lived it. The approximately 1,000 pensioners' folders are filed alphabetically and located in the Archives Division of The Texas State Library. The records consist of affidavits, service records, and miscellaneous data of family and friends. Most of the affidavits contain a wealth of information which includes place and date of enlistment along with date of discharge, death and, in most cases, date of the pensioner's arrival in Texas. According to the compilers, persons proving descent from these veterans should qualify for membership in the Sons/Daughters of the Republic of Texas. An index comprised of more than 2,800 names reflects multiple listings of Billingsley, Briscoe, Burleson, Campbell, Cleveland, Davis, Fannin, Fisher, Green, Harris, Johnson, Martin, Rogers, Sherman, Wilson and many others. Instructions for ordering photocopies of individual entries in the marriage register and marriage bond books are offered. MDK

Created in 1817 from Roane County, Morgan County is bordered by Scott, Anderson, Roane, Cumberland and Fentress Counties. Family historians will find this history a convenient starting point by virtue of its inclusion, in its early pages, of many names of the area's first explorers and settlers. Listed therein are families settling in Morgan County on North Carolina land grants received by Revolutionary War soldiers: W.L.E. Davidson, Housley Human, Charles McClung, Isaiah Patton, Tobias Peters, and the Alley and Sexton families. Surnames mentioned in the book comprise a longer list than that found in many similar works. Many names, however, are not included in the index necessitating a careful examination of the book's contents. JCH

In his publication announcement the compiler/publisher of this book declares it a genealogical history of Robert Boyd, a settler (ca. 1737) in the area that is now Franklin County, Pennsylvania. His work traces descendants through Robert Boyd's grandson of the same man who came to Chester County before the Revolution and settled in the Fishing Creek section. Although no relationship to Robert Boyd can be documented at present, descendants of the family of Charles Boyd, who settled in the same area of South Carolina in 1785, are included. Other genealogies of families found in Chester County before 1700, and set forth here, are those of William and Margaret Linn and of Hugh Drennan, Sr. Related families are Craig, Gaston, Strait, Roach, Reid and Robinson. This genealogical history traces through the tenth generation the progeny of James Buckley, Revolutionary War patriot who died in Pittsylvania County, Virginia October 6, 1787, and his

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wife, Mary. Their son, James Buckley, Jr., was a Revolutionary War soldier. He married Mary Ridgeway September 4, 1788 in Halifax County, Virginia and later moved to Tennessee--first to Williamson, then to Weakley County. Ned Ray McWherter, present Governor of Tennessee, is a sixth generation descendant of James Buckley. Also descended from James Buckley is Thomas Mac Buckley, Administrative Coordinator of the Tennessee Department of Education--and the compiler's husband. Mr. Buckley is doubly descended from the earliest ancestor listed here tracing his descent through both his paternal and maternal lines. JCH

In addition to the Phillips family group sheets, the compilation contains Bible records, wills, obituaries, family photographs, and miscellaneous service records, letters, and historical highlights. Information on families related by marriage to Alpha Phillips and his descendants is also included. Citations are in six parts: name of passenger, his age, place and year of arrival, code referring to the source book offering the particular list, and the page number on which the name is listed. In Part One of the book Mr. Perry charts the descendants of Robert Brownfield, Sr. and his wife, Jean, who came to America from Ireland before 1737 and settled with their four children in Chester County, Pennsylvania. Part Two traces descendants of the couple through their son, Robert Brownfield, Jr. and his wife, Jenny Stuart. Florah Brownfield, daughter of the latter couple and granddaughter of the former, married Irish immigrant, David Porter, in 1781 in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina and died in Carroll County, Tennessee in 1844. The book's contents include photos and verbatim quotes from significant documents. Data is efficiently organized and presented in a format that is easy to comprehend, easy to follow. JCH

Formed in 1809 from Stewart and Smith Counties, Humphreys is bordered by Houston, Dickson, Hickman, Perry and Benton Counties. During the early years of the county many records were lost to court house fires, and these abstracts represent the county's earliest extant tax records. That portion of the volume devoted to marriage records is comprised of abstracts from the microfilm of the original marriage books H, I and J dating from March of 1888. Marriage books A, C, D, F and G were abstracted and indexed in an earlier volume by Burns and Fischer. The compilers have used an easy-to-read format listing grooms alphabetically with separate indices for brides and bondsmen. JCH

Ingram marriages, wills, census and military records, family charts, and a wealth of other information comprise the whole. According to the compiler, it offers "a foundation for researchers to build upon." MDK

Picking up the families alphabetically she devotes a section each to Allen, Blair, Cargile, Condrey, Coppin, Cowan, Gonce, Grider, Hackworth, Harmon, Jones, Kennedy, Laxton, Poythress, Rigney, Ruth, St. John, Talley, Taylor, Wilson, Wood and Wynn/Winn. As it must be, for a family record of this scope, her list of references is long. However, sources are conveniently listed, citations appropriately made and easily referenced. If any of the names listed here are the subject of your research, this book deserves high priority on your search list. JCH

By using a numbering system, the author keeps record of nine generations of Tabbs including that of seventh generation Alexander (Sandy) Tabb, who had nineteen children. Following vital statistics and anecdotes, the author includes letters and legal documents. MDK

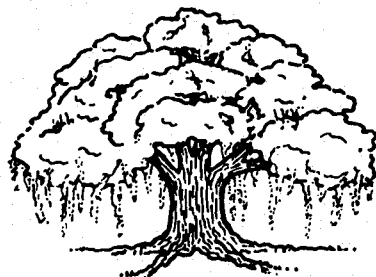
